Updates from the Provost's Office (D. Kruger)

Dr. Kruger thanked the Senate for holding Grievance Review Committee Elections and reported that one college is still holding elections. Dr. Johnson is starting on November 1 and she looks forward to working with all stakeholders. She already has numerous meetings scheduled for her first day, including one with Senate leadership.

Reply to athletics budget questions (M. Gasperecz, VP of Business Affairs, T. Duncan, VP of Athletics)

The following questions were submitted to the faculty anonymous questions form:

These are budget questions for the administration. The context here is that there is a rumour that athletics overspent **substantially**. It was a favorite of the Nicklow's and it is important to understand the legacy and how much the new administration is planning to spend given our budget situation (likely to *not* get better with the new gov in BR).

Is it true that the athletics program overran it budget for AY 22-23?

If so, what was the total amount and how was it covered?

What is the athletics program's budget for FY 23-24?

Mamie Gasperecz addressed the Senate and answered the questions:

Yes, Athletics overran its Budget in fiscal year 2022-23. John Nicklow allowed it to be increased with every request and MG was not aware of this at the time. They started with 8 million, which was reduced to 7.8 million and they ultimately expended 8.9 million. Athletics was not the only other department that overran its budget. MG would like to develop more robust financial reporting for those managing budgets. She was critical of JN's approval of additional spending without having such reporting available.

The 2023-24 budget for Athletics is 7.7 million.

MG believes that we do not have a realistic financial picture right now. JN's plan had been to fundraise to make up the budget shortfall. Discussion followed.

Tim Duncan also offered the following response:

There is supposed to be a 4.5% maximum percentage of university budget for athletics. Athletics was not allowed to cut any parts of their budget, despite asking about the possibilities of furloughs or cutting scholarships. Athletics was able to fill one vacant position, but lost others that they were not able to replace.

There were questions from the senate about how many other departments had overspent their budget in 2022-23. MG will check on this.

Discussion followed.

First year student profile presentation (S. Williamson, Director, First-Year Student Academic Success)

Shannon Williamson provided a presentation of the demographics of this year's freshman class. The presentation is attached to these minutes.

United Campus Workers presentation (M. Krochmal)

There was an overview of the United Campus Workers Union.

Updates from the Faculty Senate President (S. Rick)

SR reminded the senate that faculty are eligible for University service awards. He also asked for senators to let him know if they have a personal website on a University domain that is inaccessible.

Old Business

There was a resolution to make the International Education Advisory Committee a standing committee of the faculty senate. Connie Phelps moved to postpone the vote on the resolution so that the administrative committee could examine the proposal. The postponement was seconded by Ray Rodriguez. Discussion about the postponement followed. The motion carried to have the vote postponed and to have the administrative committee examine it.

New Business

There was a question about what officially constitutes "hybrid" classes from Jim Logan. Students are now charged an online fee for hybrid classes. Discussion followed.







13 COUNTRIES REPRESENTED IN THE 2023 COHORT




STUDENTS EARNIING PRIOR CREDIT

41% reported taking Dual Enrollment courses


32% reported taking AP courses

6% reported taking 1B courses




It is well established in literature that earning prior credit builds academic confidence, allows exploration, prepares students for rigor of college, and saves money and time to degree.


DO YOU HAVE ACCESS TO A PERSONAL COMPUTER?




WILL YOU HAVE ACCESS TO THE INTERNET AT HOME?
